


FOURTH WOMEN'S WORLD BOWLS CHAMPIONSHIPS – 1981.

WILLOWDALE, TORONTO, CANADA

TEAM MANAGERESS' REPORT

The Team departed from Hong Kong on Saturday, 25th July at 11 a.m. and arrived, after a twenty hour flight, in Toronto at 7 p.m. the same day. We were met on arrival by our appointed Hostess, Mrs. Evelyn Young (who became our Canadian 'Mum') and her husband.

During the first week we were entertained by our Host Club, RUNNYMEAD and were given an official Reception by Mayor Mel Lastman, of North York where Willowdale is situated.

Although RUNNYMEAD CLUB invited us to use their green for practice during the week, the distance (45 minutes drive) from our hotel with no direct public transport made it impossible so we were fortunate to be able to make arrangements to play at the Muir Park green which was just across the road from the hotel. Unfortunately, for the next three days it poured and only on the Thursday were Linda and Lena able to take advantage of a practice as the rest of us had committed ourselves to join the rest of the teams on a day excursion to Niagara Falls.

The Games began on Saturday, 1st August, with Helen Wong playing in the Singles and Linda King, Joan Humphreys, Rae O'Donnell and Lena Sadick playing in the Fours. During the week that followed they played seventeen games, Helen winning twelve of her games and losing five and the Fours also winning twelve and losing five. Helen became the Bronze Medallist and the Fours the Silver Medallists. As our hotel companions, Israel, won the Bronze medal in the Fours there was great cause for celebration that night but very little time as we only got back to the hotel at 10.30 p.m. and had to be up the next morning at 6.30 a.m. to begin the Pairs and Triples.

The greens during the first week were, in the words of the President of I.W.B.B. and most players, a nightmare. Posted as running between 10 – 11 seconds, on timing them our way we found them nearer to 7 – 8 seconds which meant that you had to heave every wood. Many of the rinks had no grass from within one to three yards from the ditch and it was quite common to see a wood go past the jack to the end of the green then roll back two yards and become shot! First class players

found themselves having to play one hand regardless of shot as it was impossible to play the other. On the Thursday, all Manageresses called a meeting to complain about the conditions and ask that the grass be cut and cut diagonally and not in straight lines and circles. In North York the Parks & Gardens Section look after all bowling greens as well as the beautiful Parks and unfortunately cut the greens in the same way!

After this there was definitely some improvement, partly because they were cut properly and also due to their being played on regularly – no one had been permitted to play on the greens for over a month prior to the Games. However, the first weeks heavy programme and strenuous conditions played under alternating scorching sun, torrential rain, electric thunder storms had already begun to take its toll and England, New Zealand and Scotland all lost players and had to use their substitutes.

In the Pairs competition, Helen and Joan won five out of their first nine games. The abominably heavy conditions again took their next victim and Helen, on doctors orders and having played by this time over 2,300 woods in 11 consecutive days, was forced to withdraw. Maisie Azevedo substituted

and she and Joan won three and lost four of the next seven games, carrying Hong Kong into a very creditable eighth place and keeping our very valuable overall points. To emphasize the strenuous conditions, although Joan was extremely fit and had done a lot of hard running before the Games, on the first day she took over as Skip, playing four woods for twenty-one heads, even she got strained muscles and she spent the rest of the tournament with tightly bandaged legs.

Our Triples, Linda, Rae and Lena, performed magically throughout the week only losing two games out of sixteen and those to Zimbabwe and Fiji, both hot contenders. It was a tragedy that the seventeenth game had to be cancelled due to weather conditions – the jack even when hurled could not get up to the first flag and in the trial roll up no wood could reach it either. However, there is no doubt that our Triples were the true Gold Medallists having won more games than any other team.

In the overall Daily Mirror Trophy, Hong Kong came in second position – the Gold, Silver and Bronze medals making us very strong and the eighth position in the Pairs adding very valuable points.

In view of the fact that on ten out of the fifteen days of the Champions we played games starting at 6 p.m. it meant that we had to eat lunch and dinner at the Greens which, of necessity could only be cold salad and pickles – not the ideal food for an Asian team. However, due to the kindness of Chinese friends in Toronto who not only supported us but also brought along on several days, Chinese home-made soups, fruit, congee and rice, we managed to survive.

To those H.K./Canadian friends, to those who came from Hong Kong and supported us, to the men of the H.K. Football Club who gave us tremendous support and encouragement in the long months of practice, and to the A.S.F. & O.C. and the K.C.C. for their wonderful 'welcome home' parties, may I offer you all our thanks.

To the Team itself – it is not easy for seven women of different nationalities and customs to travel half way across the world, live together in close proximity under strange conditions, take part in a highly competitive and exhausting competition and come out not only victorious but extremely popular with the other countries and organizers – to they who made it possible, my personal sincere thanks. It was an experience which provided many magic moments and happy memories. I know, by the wonderful press coverage we received and the welcome home we got, that HONG KONG is as proud of you as I am. Thank you.



THE KENT INTERNATIONAL BOWLS CLASSIC

NOVEMBER 24TH – 29TH 1981

After almost one year of planning and preparation, the Kent International Bowls Classic finally got under way on Tuesday 29th November at the Kowloon Bowling Green Club. The overseas bowlers had arrived the previous week and had undertaken a coach trip to the New Territories, a welcoming reception at the Hong Kong Cricket Club, an exhibition game of bowls at Victoria Park and a tram trip on Hong Kong Island and the stage was now set for the 'Classic'. And Classic it turned out to be!

The opening ceremony, which had been preceded by a cocktail party for invited guests, included the full military band of the Queen's Own Royal Highlanders, flag raising, an attractive Lion Dance and speeches by the President of the HKLBA and the President of the Amateur Sports Federation and Olympic Committee of Hong Kong, who opened the tournament by bowling the first bowl to the delight of some two hundred spectators. This was followed by the first round games which saw the Hong Kong teams fare reasonably well and included a fine 24-13 victory by CCCs George Souza Jr and Philip Chok over the strong and fancied England team represented by Jimmy Hobday and Tony Allcock.

The tournament was being played in two sections, each section comprising four National plus four club sides playing a seven match Round-Robin with the top two teams entering the Semi-Finals.

Rounds 2 and 3 were played on the Wednesday and at the end of the day no team remained unbeaten.

By Friday, a rest day, five rounds had been completed. England and New Zealand headed sections A & B respectively but the tournament was wide open with local clubs, in particular HKFC, KBGC, KCC and IRC still well in contention along with Hong Kong, Scotland, Wales, Newcastle District and Australia.

Round 6, played on Saturday morning saw the elimination of Hong Kong leaving two teams, HKFC and Newcastle to contest the runners-up berth in Section A, (England had qualified by virtue of their win over Ireland) whilst in Section B a most exciting and intriguing situation had developed with no fewer than seven clubs being in with a chance of qualification. Not surprisingly, the final round provided the large audience with an afternoon of exciting, thrilling and top class bowls and in the end the Semi finalists came from overseas countries with Newcastle District finishing second to England, and Scotland winning Section B narrowly from New Zealand.

The semi-finals on Sunday morning will surely never be forgotten by any of the near capacity crowd. Two games of near perfection were played in ideal conditions and resulted in victory for England over New Zealand and Newcastle District over Scotland setting the stage for a final confrontation between Jimmy Hobday & Tony Allcock of England and Darby Ross and Robbie Dobbins of Newcastle District. Earlier in the week England had won the section game by a handsome 29-9 margin but in the Final, Darby and Robbie turned the tables by winning 18-17 after at one stage leading 17-7.

At the conclusion of the final, all sixteen teams paraded onto the green where the presentation of the Kent Trophy was made to the winners by Mr. Hilton Cheong-Leen, Chairman of the Urban Council, with in attendance Mr. John Wisner, Managing Director of Brown and Williamson (Asia) Tobacco. It was sad to see the flags lowered to the tune of "Amazing Grace" played by two pipers in full Scottish Regalia, but it was, and is, most pleasing to reflect on all the good things that the Kent Classic provided.

We've had the opportunity to publicise Lawn Bowls and bring the World's best bowlers to Hong Kong, thanks to the valued assistance of a first class sponsor and Patron and we've been able to prove to ourselves and to the world that although we are only a small Association we have the ability to share the International scene. It was marvellous to have our overseas bowlers with us. Each one was a credit to his country and Association. It was also an invaluable experience for our local club bowlers who contributed in no small way to the playing success of the tournament. And lastly, the undoubted success of the Classic was obviously reward enough for the organising committee who voluntarily put in so many hours of their own time to "make it happen".

The Moorooka Club, about 12 miles south of Brisbane, will be used for the 1982 Commonwealth Games and in order to try out the facilities the organisers arranged for 19 men's team and 12 ladies' teams to take part in the S.G.I.O. games. Four greens (24 rinks) are available and in 1982 a full round-robin will be played but here, due to the shortage of time, this was not possible. Thus the competition was basically in three sections, Australian States, Overseas Teams, Australian & other Internationals, each team meeting each other in the same section and one from each of the other sections.

David Tso in the singles played excellent bowls and lost only two games. Philip Chok and George Souza played good bowls generally but only won three out of their seven games. The fours, B.K. Koh, Ken Wallis, Keith Bosley and O.K. Dallah were unfortunate in some games but it was evident that they needed more practice together on this type of green. The Ladies, Naty Rozario, Sue Thomas and Lena Sadick, particularly in the first half, failed to find form but in the second half played better as a team winning two of their seven games.

The men's behaviour both on and off the green was of a very high standard and the ladies team were highly thought of.

It would appear that the main reason for the lack of bowling success of this whole team was the lack of experience on the tift dwarf greens. The greens were running at 16 to 17 seconds and often higher in the middle of the day – apart from the last day when it rained. The green had to be taken out into the adjoining rink and the playing surface was exceedingly fine with no grip on the bowl. The one thing that these games has taught us is that if we are to have any chance in 1982 our bowlers must be in Brisbane at least two weeks prior to the Games. We have nothing to be ashamed of in not coming back with medals this time – at least we have now experienced these greatly different conditions and have learnt what has to be done for 1982.

Two clubs made overseas visits in 1981.



Their first port of call was San Francisco where, in addition to three games of bowls, old friendships were renewed with ex-Hong Kong bowlers, Saco Delgado, Y.Y. Chung, Martin Wong, Marie Rosario and Jock Brown. This was followed by a short flight to Vancouver and the opportunity to play indoors at the Pacific Bowls Club with further games arranged, and superb hospitality enjoyed at clubs in Vancouver and Seattle. As with the K.C.C. tour much sight-seeing was also included.

So many friends were made and so many happy memories brought back to Hong Kong that both K.C.C. and H.K.F.C. are planning further tours which will surely be equally successful and enjoyable.

Sending down toucher after toucher, Silva notched two singles and a brace on the next three successive ends to clinch the match and title.


The victory made Tso one of the very few bowlers who has won all the three major Singles titles, the other two being the Champion of Champions which he won last year without losing a game and the Knockout Singles he won on two previous occasions.






