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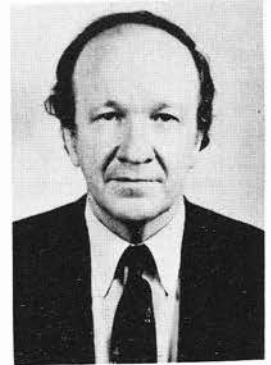

Secretary's Report

Again due to the lack of Summer Time the year 1978 has not been an easy one for either lawn bowlers or the various competition sub-committees attempting to integrate their respective competitions both within the Association and in conjunction with the Ladies Association. The Colony Championship Sub-Committee are to be congratulated on carrying out a heavy programme of events under very trying circumstances. The Hong Pairs is the only championship to have been deleted but the programme itself has had to be extended into February and March rather than Completing the Colony Championships in December. This could put into jeopardy the Association's normal winter competitions of the Rothman's Pairs and the Scott Trophy but I feel sure that with the co-operation of lawn bowlers, member clubs and the weather, the next sub-committee will carry on the good work of the present one.



The Club de Recreio is to be congratulated on winning two out of the three League Competitions-the First Division (Recreio "A") and the Third Division. The Second Division was won by the United Services Recreation Club.

Our appreciation is extended to the Presidents and General Committees of all our Member Clubs for again making their facilities available to us for both official competitions and meetings. In particular, we are once more indebted to the Kowloon Bowling Green Club for the very extensive use of their greens.

The highlight of the year was of course Hong Kong's success at the Commonwealth Games in Edmonton in winning both the Pairs and Fours Competitions. Hong Kong made bowling history as this is the first time that the same players have won both a World Championship and Commonwealth Games Pairs title. The success of the Fours team was outstanding as two of the players had never been exposed to international competitions previously.

Hong Kong was represented at the Papua/New Guinea Open Pairs when Eric Liddell and O. K. Dallah were invited to compete along with other overseas bowlers. It is with congratulations that the Association reports that our representatives won the Gold Medal. The same two players were selected by the Association to take part in the Newcastle All Stars Pairs Tournament and Eric Liddell was one of ten players throughout the world to be invited to compete in the First Indoor World Bowls Championships held in Scotland in January of this year.

The coming season will again be a busy one with a very intensive schedule of events. As well as the normal competitions we shall be holding selection trials for the five man team to represent Hong Kong at the 4th World Bowls Championships due to be held in Melbourne, Australia from the 16th January to the 2nd February 1980.

No report would be complete without grateful acknowledgement to the Executive Officers and Members of the General Committee for their support and generous service to the Association throughout the year.

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MENS SINGLES CHAMPION

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OF COURSE HE'S NOT ASLEEP- HE'S JUST PSYCHING HIMSELF INTO THE GAME !

PHILIP Chok, the Rinks Gold Medallist in the Commonwealth Games, walked away with another honour yesterday when he clinched the Hongkong Lawn Bowls Singles title by defeating George Souza Jr 21-12, in a tame final at the Hongkong Football Club.

Both players lacked the fire and the good quality of bowls, this was due to their own tension, as both players know each other game well. Philip Chok took the lead of 9-3, after the seven head with his drawing game.

George Souza Jr narrowed the margin to 9-7, after the ninth end. From then onwards, it was a slow ding-dong game with neither player putting in good shots. Philip Chok then took another lead again, by scoring three braces and a single to take a big lead of 17-9, after the 16th head.

George Souza Jr, a game fighter on the green, stormed back and managed to score a three on the 17th head to narrow the margin to 17-12 to make a stand and fightbut his brave act was of no avail.

The turning point of Souza Jr's downfall came on the 18th head when he was bowling steadily and managed to put in a shot six inches to the jack. Souza Jr then, with his last wood, clipped the jack and gave the shot to Chok instead. The score then stood 18-12 after the 18th end.

Having lost much of his confidence he seemed to be slightly shaken and Philip Chok took the advantage by scoring a brace to build a big lead of 20-12 on the 19th head. Playing on the 20th head for the deciding game point, Souza Jr again made another blunder when lying one measure for two he again accidentally sliced the jack to Chok's wood and gave the shot and the game to Philip Chok by 21-12.

HELEN Wong, of the Craigengower Cricket Club set an all time Ladies Singles Lawn bowls record when she won the title for the seventh time by dethroning the reigning champion Sandi Zakoske, 21-18, after 23 thrilling heads in the final played at Club de Recreio green, yesterday. It was a superb final on which both players deserved to be congratulated, for putting up a sterling bowls performances that gained thunderous applause from a very encouraging crowd at the Club de Recreio - King's Park.

Helen, one of Hongkong most consistent Ladies Lawn Bowlers, and the recent Women's World Bowls Gold medallist was in devastating form throughout the final.

And yesterday it was her crowning glory, for since the Singles tournament existed in 1956, she has won it on seven occasions. Helen has won it in 1958, 60, 62, 63, 71, 74, and now to set a record which will be very difficult to break in the Ladies section of the Hongkong Ladies Lawn Bowls Association.

XITH COMMONWEALTH GAMES - EDMONTON CANADA

3RD - 12TH AUGUST 1978

Looking back six months it becomes very difficult to write anything new about the players who brought back the golden glory to Hong Kong as so much was written and said at the time. The memory of the medal presentation lives on but quickly forgotten is the memory of the nervous tension and strain felt by all.

We left Hong Kong one day late due to S.T.S. Agnes causing delays to flights. Panic at the airport - no visas for the U.S.A. Although we were only transit passengers we were informed that we couldn't land in the U.S.A. without a visa! Eventually we were allowed aboard after being told that we would have to be under escort in the States - fortunately the Americans treated us well and we encountered no problems. Just about air-borne when the Captain announced that instead of going to San Francisco (where we were to get our connecting flight and meet O. K. Dallah who had gone ahead on a business trip) we would be landing at Los Angeles. Eventually all was sorted out and we met up with "O. K." at Edmonton airport.

The three residential tower blocks of the University of Alberta provided good accommodation and the facilities available made this complex an excellent choice for the Commonwealth Games Village. The team was housed in twin bedded rooms with a communal bathroom. Each floor had it's own kitchen which was also equipped with a washing machine, tumbler drier and steam irons. By the time we left Edmonton we had all become model housewives. In the evening bridge became one of the main forms of relaxation. Even I tried to play - once only. Saco read a book on bridge and tried his hand at it - with far better success than mine.

The Canadian organisation couldn't be faulted. Meals were available 24 hours a day with an exceedingly wide selection of food freely available. Buses transported us backwards and forwards from the Village to the Coronation Greens with a whole fleet of new cars and volunteer drivers put at the disposal of the various teams.

A number of social events were attended during the period prior to the Games, but once the Games had commenced invitations to social functions were declined. We arrived towards the end of the Klondyke Festival. On our second day in Edmonton Celina Silva, C. K. and Peggy Sung invited the team to a Chinese dinner. We attended various receptions given by local organisations such as the "700 Wing", the Chinese Graduate Association etc.

During the week preceeding the Games the greens were allocated to each country twice per day for two hours at a time. Hong Kong took full advantage of their schedule and on the first few days took the time to get to know the greens. This was followed by friendly games against Papua New Guinea, New Zealand, Australia and Canada. These sessions proved invaluable in both getting the team operating together and for general experience on the Canadian greens.

The opening ceremony on Thursday 3rd August was held in the new Jubilee Stadium with Her Majesty, The Queen, performing the opening. C. C. Delgado was the flag bearer for the Hong Kong Team. On Friday 4th August, a small Opening Ceremony was held at the Coronation Greens when G. Souza Jr. carried the Hong Kong flag. The Royal Party attended the greens on Friday morning, 4th August and watched part of the first round.

The final standings of the various teams has been reproduced in the tables. George Souza played good bowls throughout and even up to the last game was still in with a chance for a medal. He had an excellent game against John Snell of Australia (winner of the Silver Medal) with the game being 19 all before Snell took two singles to win the game. Against David Bryant of England George excelled and up to the last four heads maintained a level footing with Bryant. George was an excellent ambassador for Hong Kong and was well thought of by all who came into contact with him.

The Pair of Saco Delgado and Eric Liddell was always in with the chance of winning a medal. The final three games were outstanding successes against Australia, England and Canada. They went into the last game in second place behind Canada with the knowledge that whichever team won would be certain of the gold medal but that due to the very small difference in shots and the tightness of the competition, the loser of the game would come only 5th or 6th. Despite the fact that they were playing the home team, who were in with a chance to make bowling history for Canada having led the pairs competition for most of the Games, Eric and Saco's Standard of play was such that the Canadian spectators gave them the ovations they truly deserved. It must also be remembered that as well as playing in front of the spectators, the Canadian Television gave full coverage of the sport. The experience of the Hong Kong Pair told in the end and they achieved an exceedingly high standard of play. The Fours Team of Philip Chok, M. B. Hassan Jr., Roberto da Silva and O. K. Dallah although in their first days play just won against Fiji by one shot and lost to England by the same margin, soon settled down and were early favourites. They only lost one other game, against New Zealand, and went into the last round in front but knowing that to be sure of the gold they had to win against Western Samoa - who were at the bottom of the table. There were a few anxious moments during that game as the Western Samoans had nothing to lose. The Hong Kong Four, playing as a team, came through to win 29 to 23.

It was a very proud moment for Hong Kong when six of our players received their gold medals. The following day the Closing Ceremony of the Games was performed by the Duke of Edinburgh in the Jubilee Stadium. The celebration of the previous night - and early morning - did not prevent the team from taking part with full enthusiasm.

There are many people to whom I owe a debt of gratitude for all their help and support. I must record my thanks to Eric Liddell as his experience in previous international events was of great assistance. We had a fine group of Hong Kong spectators - Maria Ramchan, Joyce Liddell, Elvie and Jenny Chok and Jack Sheedy. C. K. and Peggy Sung were of invaluable assistance and made sure the team was supplied with Chinese food. In particular I must add our thanks to Mr. A. de O. Sales for his very enthusiastic support - he was present at virtually every session of bowls despite the call upon his time for attendance at other sports, official meetings and functions etc.

Finally I would like to express my unlimited thanks to the whole team for all the help they gave me and for their contribution to Hong Kong. One of the outstanding features at Edmonton, not only in my opinion but observed by others and conveyed to me by both officials and players alike, was the team spirit of the Hong Kong bowlers. We went there as a team, we lived together as a team, they played together as a team, we relaxed together as a team. There is no doubt in my mind that this particular selection became one of the closest knit group of bowlers to have represented Hong Kong. Regardless of any medals Hong Kong would still have been proud of them - I am proud to have had the opportunity to be associated with them.

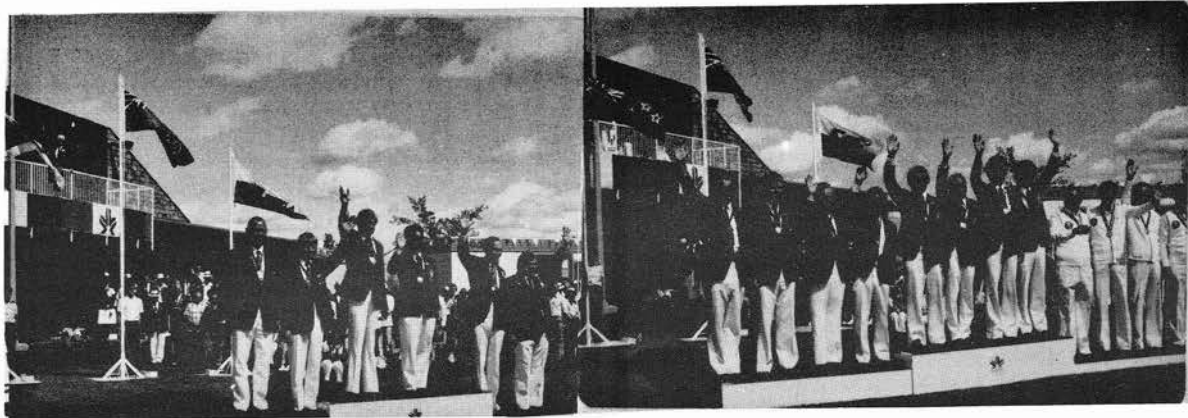

THE TEAM

SINGLES

George Souza (Junior) was 35 years of age, having commenced playing bowls at the age of 22. This was his first international representation at lawn bowls. He is also well known for his other sporting interests which include badminton, softball, hockey and cricket. He represented Hong Kong in the hockey interports in 1958, 59 & 60 and took part in the World Cup Softball Championships (Asian Region) in 1968. His father is also very well known on the bowling green having represented Hong Kong four times and bringing back a gold medal for the fours event from the Edinburgh Commonwealth Games in 1970. George Senior has also been a keen all-round sportsman, representing Hong Kong in cricket from 1953 to 1958 and being well respected for his softball activity. George Junior had early success in lawn bowls, being in the winning Colony Triples team the year after he took up the sport. He was in the winning Fours in 1970, Triples again in 1972, won the Knock-Out singles in 1973, Open Pairs in 1974 and 1977 and also was the Champion of Champions in 1977. Together with Philip Chok he gained the first Colony title of the 1978 season when they won the Rothman Pairs. In 1978 George also won the Colony Knock-Out Singles, was in the winning Colony Mixed Rinks and was Runner-up to Philip Chok in the Colony Open Singles.

George was born in Shanghai in 1942, coming with his parents to Hong Kong in 1946. He was educated at St. Pauls Convent and St. Josephs College and is still single. George is a member of the Craigengower Cricket Club.

PAIRS

Lead

"Saco" Delgado was 47 years of age and was no newcomer to the international bowling world. He commenced his international experience at the Commonwealth Games in Edinburgh in 1970 when he won a Gold Medal in the Fours event. Two years later at the 2nd World Bowls Championships in Worthing Saco won a Bronze Medal in the Fours and together with Eric Liddell a Gold Medal for the Pairs. Since then he has represented Hong Kong in the Commonwealth Games at Christchurch in 1974, 3rd World Championships in South Africa in 1976 and at other international events in Pretoria, South Africa in 1973 and Newcastle Australia in 1978. He won the Colony Open Singles in 1969 and 1973, Knock-Out Singles in 1969 and 1977, was Champion of Champions in 1973 and 1974, won the Open Pairs in 1972 and 1975, both the Mixed Pairs and Mixed Rinks in 1977 and he helped to win the Colony International Competition for Portugal in 1969, 1970, 1971 and 1974. In 1978 he was Runner-Up in the Open Pairs. Saco was born in Hong Kong and educated at St. Joseph's College. He is married with five children and is an accountant with the Hong Kong and Shanghai Banking Corporation. Saco is a member of the Club de Recreio, and again led to Eric Liddell in the pairs event at the XIth Commonwealth Games.

Skip

Eric Liddell was 53 years of age and was the "father" of the team. Eric has represented Hong Kong internationally at lawn bowls continuously since 1954 when he was at the Commonwealth Games in Vancouver, winning a Silver Medal in the Fours. The other Commonwealth Games in which lawn bowls were included and at which Eric played for Hong Kong were Cardiff 1958, Perth 1962, Edinburgh 1970 and Christchurch 1974. He was also in the teams at the World Lawn Bowls Championships since they started, i.e. Sydney 1966, Worthing 1972 and South Africa in 1976 as well as taking part in the international events in Pretoria, South Africa in 1973 and Newcastle, Australia in 1978. It was at the Second World Championships in Worthing in 1972 that Eric, along with Saco Delgado, won the Gold Medal for the Pairs event. Eric's history of wins at Colony level is very long, at the last count there were at least 17 titles including Singles 1955 and 1971, Pairs 1963, Triples 1960 and 1966, Fours 1968, Colony International Competition for Australia in 1966 and 1976, and he has been Champion of Champions five times having held the title for four years continuously between 1969 and 1972 inclusive. Eric was born in Bairnsdale in the state of Victoria in Australia and is an Australian Citizen. He received his education in telecommunication engineering in Australia, which he left in 1951 to come to Hong Kong with the Hong Kong Telephone Company. Eric holds an M.B.E. in recognition of his work with the blind and physically handicapped. He is married with two sons, both of whom are now in Australia. His wife Joyce is also well known in lawn bowls having represented Hong Kong at the Ladies World Championships in Worthing in 1977. Eric has been President of the Hong Kong Lawn Bowls Association three times and is the current President for 1978. Eric plays for the Kowloon Bowling Green Club and is a Past President and an Honorary Life Member of that club. As well as skipping the pairs event at the XIth Commonwealth Games Eric was also the Team Captain. Following the Games he went to Papua/New Guinea with O. K. Dallah and won their Invitational Open Pairs and again with "O. K." represented Hong Kong at the 1979 Newcastle International All Stars Pairs Tournament.

FOURS

Lead

Philip Chok was 32 years of age and represented Hong Kong for the first time, although he comes from a bowling family with his mother, Elvie Chok, having won the pairs gold medal at the Ladies World Bowls Championships at Worthing in 1977. Philip, along with George Souza Jr., won the first Colony title to be decided in 1978 - the Rothman Pairs - and was part of the Colony International Competition team winning for Hong Kong in 1975. He also won the Colony Singles and Champion of Champions in 1978. Philip was born in Shanghai, coming with his parents to Hong Kong in 1948. He graduated in economics from the University of Hong Kong and is now a Principal Trade Officer in the Trade, Industry & Customs Department of the Hong Kong Government. Philip has interests in many sports, having been the recipient of the Sportsman of the Year Award from Wah Yan College in 1963 and from the University in 1968 for his ability in a variety of Sports, but mainly soccer and badminton whilst at college and tennis and athletics amongst others when at university. He took up lawn bowls at the age of 18 and is now married with a young son. Philip plays for the Craigengower Cricket Club.

No. 2

M. B. Hassan Jr. was the baddy of the team at 28 years of age. Again, like all the three new players in the team, he came from a bowling family with his father, M. B. Hassan, having represented Hong Kong at Lawn Bowls at the Commonwealth Games at Cardiff in 1958 and Perth in 1962. M. B. took up bowls in 1974 and in the same year won the Colony Open Singles followed by the Mixed Fours event in 1976. But lawn bowls is not his only sport, he has excelled in every sporting area - particularly ball games, and has not only represented Hong Kong in hockey in every interport match since 1972 but also played for Hong Kong in the Asian Games in Bangkok 1972, Malaysia 1974, Jakarta 1976 and is still actively engaged in both 1st Division hockey matches and the Hong Kong hockey team. M. B. was born in Hong Kong and educated at Caine College and is a member of the Indian Recreation Club.

No. 3

Roberto da Silva was 46 years of age and has always been a fine sportsman having excelled in all major sports since school days. He first represented Hong Kong at lawn bowls in the Commonwealth Games at Edinburgh in 1970 when playing as the No. 3 in the Fours, Hong Kong won the Gold Medal in this event. Two years later at the 2nd World Lawn Bowls Championships he skipped the Fours and won the Bronze Medal for Hong Kong. It was at Worthing that Robby gained the title of "Personality of the Games". He also represented Hong Kong in the Commonwealth Games at Christchurch in 1974 and the 3rd World Championships in South Africa in 1976. He has won 14 Colony Titles including the Knock-Out Singles in 1967, Open Pairs 1965 & 1974, Mixed Pairs (with his sister) in 1965, 1966 and 1973, Open Rinks in 1973, Mixed Triples and Mixed Rinks and helped win the Colony International Competition for Portugal in 1967, 1969, 1970 & 1971. Robby was born in Hong Kong, and was educated here. He is a Bank Officer with the Hong Kong & Shanghai Banking Corporation and is single and is a member of the Club de Recreio.

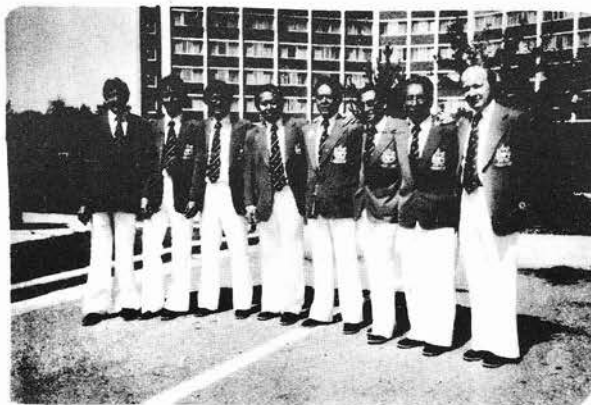
Skip

O. K. Dallah was 41 years of age and is a keen all-round sportsman. He had represented Hong Kong in lawn bowls on two previous occasions, the Commonwealth Games in Christchurch in 1974 and the 3rd World Lawn Bowls Championships in South Africa in 1976. "O. K." won the National Triples and Rinks in 1965, the Colony Open Pairs in 1978 and is also known throughout Hong Kong for his record on the hockey field. He played for Hong Kong for many years including the Asian Games in Indonesia and Thailand in 1962, 1966 and 1970 and was a member of the Hong Kong hockey team at the Tokyo Olympics in 1964. He is the Hong Kong National Hockey coach. O. K. was born in Hong Kong and educated at St. Joseph's College. He works with the Hong Kong Government as the Chief Executive Officer of the University and Polytechnic Grants Committee. He is married with one son and one daughter and plays for the Indian Recreation Club. Following the Games he won the Papua/New Guinea Open Pairs with Eric Liddell and went with Eric to the Newcastle Pairs Tournament.

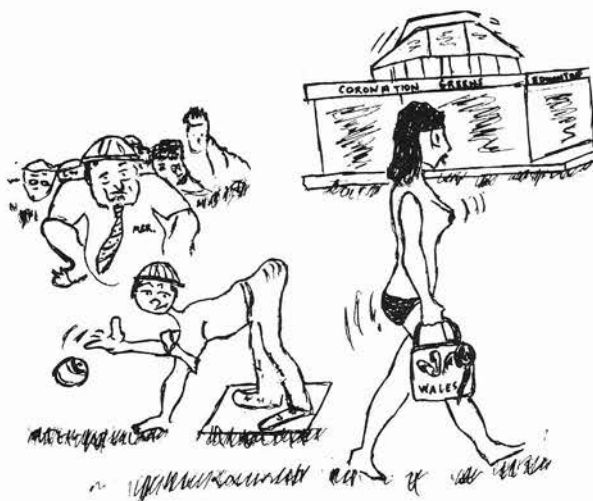
TEAM MANAGER

Geoff Murphy was 48 years of age and made no claim to being a lawn bowler of any distinction. He states that his only claim to notoriety on the bowling green was being carried through by his skip, Eric Liddell to win the Colony International Competition for Australia in 1976 and losing in the 1978 final to Portugal by one shot on an extra head. Geoff took up lawn bowls in 1972 and was his club's representative on the Hong Kong Lawn Bowls Association for two years and is now completing his second year as Honorary Secretary of the Association. He was Chairman of the Selection Committee for the XIth Commonwealth Games trials. Geoff was born in Sydney, Australia, and is the Chief Engineer of The Hong Kong & China Gas Co. He was educated at the New South Wales University of Technology and came to Hong Kong about nine years ago following 14 years with the North Thames Gas Board in London. He is married with two sons and plays for the United Services Recreation Club.

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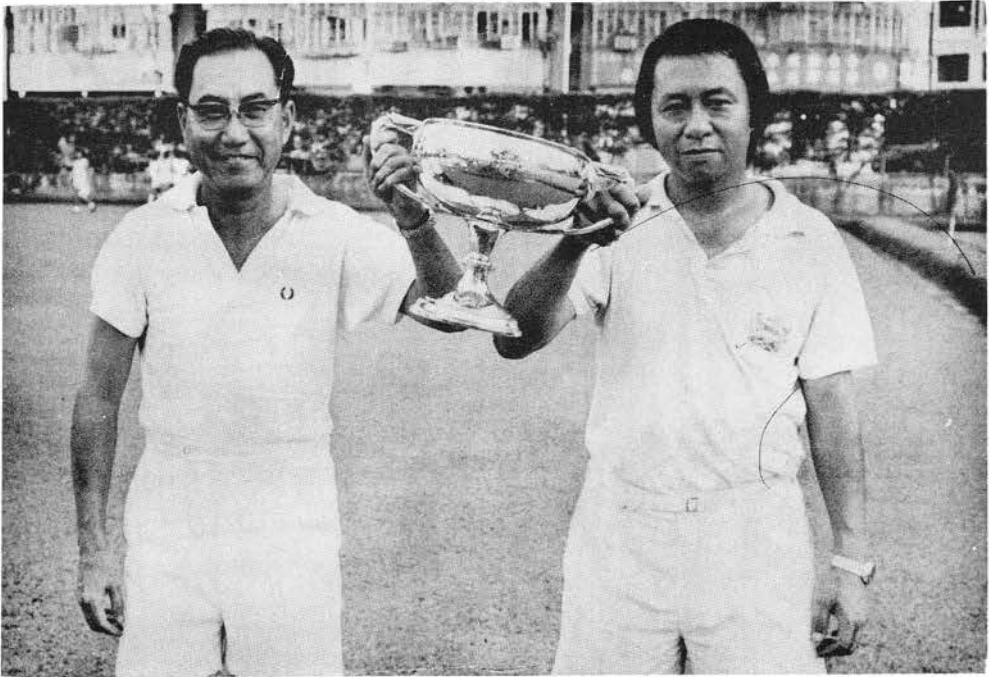

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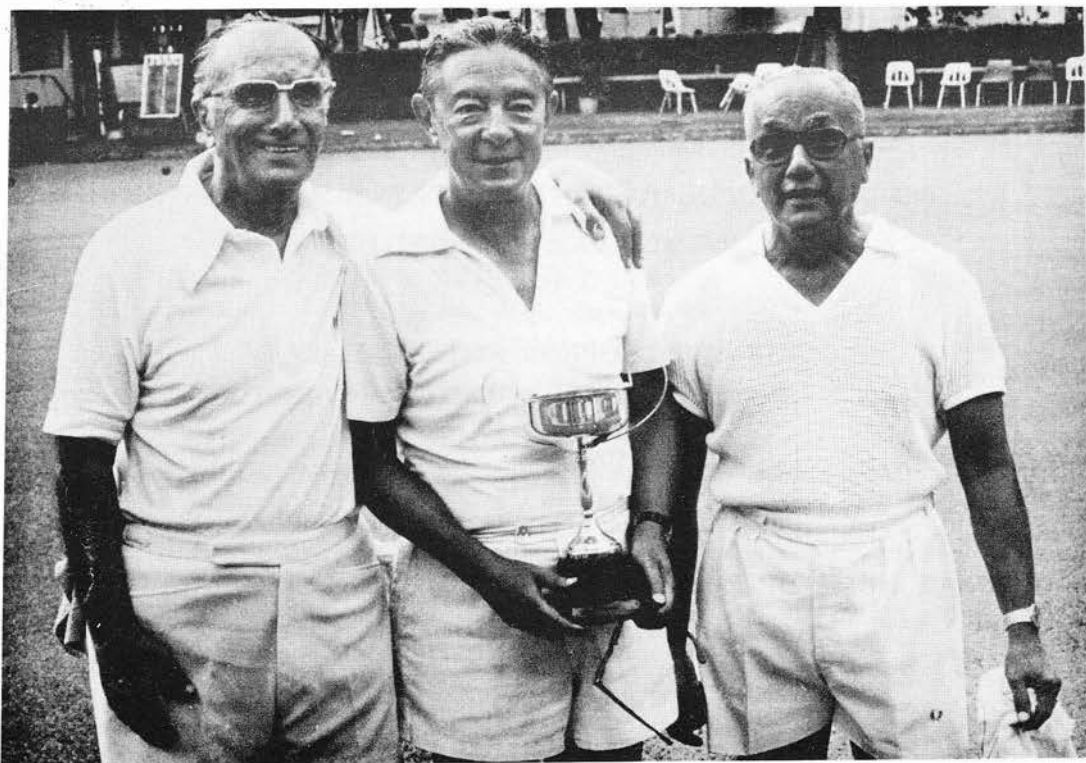

It was a rather tame and listless final for neither team had any fire, and lacked spectacular shots to make the game more exciting throughout the 18 dull heads.

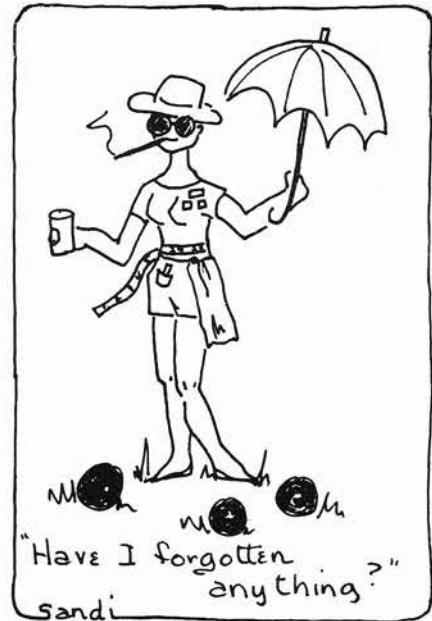
