HONG KONG LAWN BOWLS ASSOCIATION SECRETARY'S REPORT 1987

1987 has been quite a busy year for Hong Kong bowlers with fifteen clubs fielding thirty nine teams in the National League during the summer and sixteen team in the Berlitz Winter League. Entries in the National Competitions have continued to increase to the point where consideration is being given to playing preliminary rounds mid-week. Highlights of the International year were the Gateway Masters with the pairs competition won by George Souza Jr. and the Pacific Games where Hong Kong gained a Silver Medal in the Triples and fourth place in the Singles. Our own International Classic again included many of the World's best players together with our local representatives.

The National summer league resulted in CCC 'A' emerging as league champions. POC 'A' will join Division I next year by virtue of winning Division II of the league. CLBC 'A' finished top of Division III and the fourth division title was won by KCC 'E'.

In the Berlitz Shipping winter league the title was won by USRC 'A' with CCC 'A' winning the second division.

At the Gateway Masters, George Souza Jr. won the Pairs title with an undefeated record, indeed in his match against David Bryant, George won ten ends in succession winning 24-13. George has again been invited to take part in the Gateway this year and, together with Noel Kennedy took part in the International Elite Singles held by the Royal New South Wales Bowling Association in Sydney.

Noel will be going for Gold at the Embassy World Indoor Championships which is a World Indoor Bowls Council event.

Keith Bosley has received invitations for the Golden West Coast Classic in Perth and the eleventh "Hub of the Hunter" International Singles at the Telarah Bowling Club of New South Wales.

David Tso received an invitation for the Power play International Marketing Tournament in Sydney but the invitation had to be withdrawn due to the organisers being unable to raise the necessary sponsorship.

At the Pacific Games held at Lae in Papua New Guinea our team of Keith Bosley, Clive Brindle, Frank Golder, Bill McMahon and Roger Pickford narrowly missed Gold in the Triples. The Score was at 13-13 after the eighteen ends and the extra end produced a superb bowl from Darby Ross of Australia to take the title. The Triples of Darby Ross, Trevor Morris and Kenny Williams is in fact the same line up as that for the World Bowls in Auckland. Keith took fourth in the Singles being edged out by the host nation P.N.G.

The Hong Kong International Classic at KBGC this year nearly coincided with the first Hong Kong - - - Snow. After a high of 24 degrees the temperature collapsed within twenty four hours to a system shocking wet 8 degrees. This was accepted as somewhat normal by England, Ireland, Scotland and Wales but as something extreme by Australia, Newcastle District and New Zealand. Ronson Au and T.W. Mak of the Filipino Club kept the local flag flying into the semi-final where they lost in a closely fought game to lose to Ireland.

The final was between Scotland's pair Brian Middlemass & Richard Corsie and Ireland's Willie Watson and a rejuvenated Ernie Parkinson (Earlier in the week Ernie, due to a leg strain had been substituted by Alan McDonald of KBGC whose smile adequately expressed his feelings).

Thus Scotland made it three titles in a row despite the absence of George Adrain & Willie Wood this year.

The Classic Singles at HKFC was won by Australia's Paul Richards who in the final faced our own Noel Kennedy. A very tight game with Noel coming within a whisker of victory.

Our World Bowls squad of George Souza Jr. David Tso, Noel Kennedy, Danny Ho, and Mark McMahon under Manager Pat O'Dea performed well in Auckland against stiff opposition.

Still on the International front, KCC hosted ten bowlers from Japan's Yokohama Country Club which was our first visit of bowlers from Japan.

The invaluable part of S.C. Lo continued with training courses at Victoria Park, the success of which are easily judged by the standards of VLBC & CLBC.

George Sperring as Chief Umpire has held examinations and Umpires certificates have been awarded to :- Mrs. Lynnette Golder, Mrs. Jan Bosley, Peter Cheung, Bob Garten, Frank Golder & Tony Slesser. A further series of examinations is in progress.

Our Association this year approved changes to the Articles of Association in which the Article dealing with Amateurism was brought into line with changes made by the International Bowling Board and the Article regarding Management - voting rights - was upgraded to take account of the increase in the number of teams that has taken place over the years. These were the first changes to be made for 23 years.

The Association was pleased to welcome as members the newly formed China Light and Power Club. This is good news since this has added another green since KBGC lost one green earlier this year.

Association Committee Ties have been awarded to Dennis Blyth, Frank Golder, Raymond Li & Jim Viney.

I should like to express our grateful thanks to sponsors for their invaluable support during the year. The Hongkong Bank, The Council for Recreation and Sport, Waco International, The Amateur Sports Federation and Olympic Committee, Hiram Walker Ltd., City Resources (Asia) Ltd., and Tobacco Exporters International (HK) Ltd.

In Conclusion I thank for their support and assistance, the Ladies Lawn Bowls Association and last but not least Mrs. Beryl Pickford our Association Administration Assistant for her untiring work and cooperation throughout the year.

Report on the Second Pacific Bowls Championships Lae, Papua New Guinea - 1987

The Second Pacific Bowls Championships held in Lae, Papua New Guinea ran from 25 October to 8 November 1987. Nine teams took part in the Ladies' events: Australia, Canada, Cook Islands, Fiji, Hong Kong, New Zealand, Papua New Guinea, Singapore and the U.S.A.

After some twenty hours of flying and waiting in between flights, the Hong Kong team arrived in reasonable shape in Lae by the late afternoon of 22 October to a warm reception by the Chairman of the Pacific Championships Organizing Committee and the President of the Lae Bowling Club. On the following two days the team wasted no time in taking to the greens, practising two to three sessions each day in spite of the humidity and the heat of the high 30's (Celsius). It was conspicuous that Hong Kong was sometimes the only Ladies' team on the greens during the hottest part of the day when the others decided to remain within the cooler confines of the clubhouse!

The practices were in fact badly needed as, contrary to earlier belief, the three greens at the Lae Bowling Club were not at all like the Hong Kong greens. They were much faster and more akin to Australian greens, although by no means as smooth. This was largely the result of professional assistance that had been brought in from Australia especially to 'shape up' the greens for the games.

Following customary preliminaries, including a church service, a civic reception and the Official Opening Ceremony, the Championships got underway on Monday 26 October with the Pairs and the Triples.

In the Pairs, Hong Kong got off to a good start against New Zealand, Pairs winners of 1985 Pacific Games, winning 22-20. Rae and Joan continued thereon to prove a strong combination, coming second overall after having lost only one game (and that by only 2 shots on the last end) to Fiji, the eventual gold medallist who did not lose a single game in the round-robin. P.N.G. came third with two defeats but sadly lost to Cook Islands in the play-off for the bronze,.

The Triples went through the first two days of bowling with two draws, one defeat and one win. They did well to beat Australia, the eventual silver medalist, by 1 shot. Despite a heavy defeat by P.N.G. on the third day, Hong Kong still had a slim chance of the

bronze following a good win over Singapore, provided that they could win the remaining two games. However the ensuing defeat by Cook Islands eliminated any hopes of a medal. The triples lost also in their last game against Canada and came 7th overall. The host country P.N.G. won this competition.

The Singles and Fours events were played in the second week.

In the Singles Hong Kong won three games, one of which was an exciting win over P.N.G., the bronze medalist. The other two were against the U.S.A. and Canada, the latter game also being a nail-biter. Of the five games lost, two were by a narrow margin of 1 and 3 shots only during which, a high standard of bowls was displayed by both Joan and her opposition and the results could easily have been reversed. Cook Islands stole the honours in this competition by beating Australia in the Gold-medal play off.

In the Fours Hong Kong got off to a poor start by losing to Fiji and the U.S.A. on the first day, and never quite recovered from it. With two wins and six defeats, Hong Kong came 8th in the standings. New Zealand headed the table, having won every game in the round-robin, but unfortunately lost to Fiji in the play-off for the gold and silver medals.

All in all, while we were very proud and pleased to have won the silver medal in the Pairs, we were naturally also disappointed not to have achieved a higher standing in the other competitions.

The Tournament itself was very well organized. All competitions took place at the Lae Bowling Club which had three bowling greens. Two games were played each day, the first at 9:00 am and the second at 1:30 pm. Lunch and dinner were provided at the club. The two hotels where the teams were accommodated were only five to ten minutes' drive from the bowls venue and there was a regular bus service put on by Mazda from the hotel to the club and vice versa. Banking facilities, a pharmacy service and a doctor's surgery were set up at the club for the duration of the Games. Manager's meetings were held every morning to keep everyone up-to-date on changes, if any, to the schedule, matters of procedure etc. and to generally enable managers to raise matters of interest or concern.

The programme for everyone was hectic in that following each full day's bowling there was official entertainment arranged for practically every night of the tournament, comprising essentially native dancing by various cultural groups and performances by the participating teams. It is perhaps worth mentioning that the Hong Kong team's performance, which consisted of songs in English, Mandarin and Cantonese, a dragon dance and a ribbon dance by the ladies, was extremely well received and enjoyed by all.

2nd Pacific Bowls Championships

The Second Pacific Bowls Championships were held in Lae, Papua New Guinea from the 24th October thru to the 8th of November 1987 and Hong Kong were proudly represented by Keith Bosley, Clive Brindle, Bill McMahon, Frank Golder and Roger Pickford.

The venue for the event was the Lae Bowls Club which the organising committee initially believed the task to be too great for the club and the city's small population to undertake but the final analysis proved those sceptics wrong as the organisation and programme of events were a credit to the committee.

The countries competing were Australia, New Zealand, Canada, U.S.A., Japan, Norfolk Island, Papua New Guinea, Cook Islands, Singapore, Hong Kong, Fuji, a total of 11 countries compared to 7 countries in the inaugural event held in Tweed Heads, Australia in 1985.

Our team left Hong Kong on Friday 23rd of October overnighing in Manila for a 7 am departure on Saturday morning to Port Moresby. The heat of the day on arrival in Port Moresby was very oppressive with a wait in the terminal for over an hour with no air conditioning for our flight to Lae over the Owen Starly Ranges. On our arrival at Lae NADZAB airport we were met and driven to the club some 40 kilometers away where we were introduced to the President and Chairman of the organising committee and as we were the last team to arrive and with Clive having the National Flag in his possession we were finally welcomed with the hoisting of the flag to the National Anthem, then we were offered some much sought after liquid refreshment, and a BARB-B on that night.

Sunday morning was our one and only practice with the temperature still almost 34° and the sweat just pouring out of us and the greens running very fast.

Sunday lunch was the official welcome by the Lord Mayor of Lae and the Governor General of Papua New Guinea in the form of a Civic Reception at the Lae International Hotel with an outstanding buffet lunch.

The opening ceremony commenced at 1530 wherein we all marched onto the green and by this stage we were saturated with perspiration but after marching onto the green and before the speeches started the Ladies of the Club collected our Blazers which was a welcome relief. After the opening ceremony we were entertained by local dancing groups from the Maruruo Village which went on for hours they never seeming to tire or loose their voices.

Monday morning the competition started in earnest and the temperatures were still in the 30's and the mens triples in our first game were to play tournament favourites NZ but to their surprise we managed to beat them 17-15. The triples then went on to finish second to Australia in the Round Robin and qualify to play Australia in the Final for the gold medal. The game was very closely contested with Hong Kong leading 13-9 after the 15th end but the Aussies come back with a 1-2-1 to level the game at 13 all after 18 ends so an extra end had to be played and with Bill McMahon playing a brilliant shot with his first wood Hong Kong were looking at the gold only to see Darby Ross the Australian skip run into Bill's bowl to push to jack back to an Aussie bowl in a impossible position to get at and so we had to be contend with the silver medal, not bad as the Australian team was their World Bowls team.

The Pairs team of Roger and Frank played with mixed success and were unfortunate in some of their games to be pipped on the last end and finished 8th overall.

The Fours also had mixed fortunes and finished 7th overall.

In the Singles I managed to play off for the bronze medal against Papua New Guinea but am afraid it wasn't my day and finished a sad fourth.

During the two weeks that we were in Lae the team cemented old friendships and made new friends and on one occasion the team together with the ladies put on a presentation night where we presented the Association Plaques to different people and the Lae Bowls Club and also to the delight of the other competitors and the local community our song writer and entertainments member Bill McMahon put together a skit that even the team members were surprised that they could perform the way they did and the Ladies did an excellent job with their lion dance together with lion and costumes.

All in all it was a strenuous two weeks of bowls having played 22 games in 11 days together with socialising and the odd 'South Pacific' to quench ones thirst the team withstood all challenges and were truly outstanding ambassadors and a credit to the Hong Kong Lawn Bowls Association.

HONG KONG INTERNATIONAL BOWLS CLASSIC 1987

The sixth Hong Kong Bowls Classic once again attracted the cream of the World's bowlers as they jetted into this bustling and cosmopolitan city to participate in what has become a popular fixture on the international bowls calendar. Harbour cruises, the culinary flavours of eastern foods and the enticement of the thousands of shops and markets gave way to the business of the day as the overseas and local players assembled on the green at Hong Kong Football Club to commence the opening rounds of the Classic Singles. Played on a knockout basis the early games were a testing time for our visitors as the local players using their unique knowledge of the conditions caused plenty of upsets. Paul Richards, the defending Champion from Australia, survived as did World Champion Peter Bellis, Allan McCarley from Wales and CauCau Turagibeci, the genial Fijian. A thrilling finish saw local hope Noel Kennedy stage a remarkable comeback to edge Ernie Parkinson from Ireland 25-24.

Sunday dawned cloudy but dry as the quarterfinals got underway. Two previous winners, Richards and Hong Kong's George Souza fought an even struggle with both players locked at 12 all after 13 ends but the South Australian then pulled ahead and won 25-16.

Noel Kennedy continued his good form ending Phillip Chok's run and Allan McCarley impressed in deposing Turagibeci 25-19. The remaining quarter final was an epic as Bellis and the English "draw machine", John Ottoway, became locked in an extraordinary tussle where neither player could gain any significant advantage. Ottoway crept to 23-20 only to see Bellis claw back with four consecutive singles to lead 24 to 23 but it was the drawing accuracy of the English lead that gave him the game 25-24. As Bellis congratulated his opponent his comment that he had won many a game playing far worse struck a responsive chord in those who watched this enthralling encounter.

Considerable interest was shown in the Ottoway/Richards clash but it was the Australian who produced the goods as he drove when down but drew when needed to edge his opponent 25 to 20. On the other rink Kennedy shook off early nerves and settled down to a steady drawing game finally out-bowling the Welshman to win a place in the final by 25 to 16. In what many billed as a "David and Goliath" final it was Noel Kennedy who initially dominated and on the 20th end had deservedly earned a 17-9 edge which should have sealed a landmark win in his career. That it did not happen was due to the remarkable ability of the man from Adelaide to drive himself out of defeat and this he did repeatedly finally showing his experience to win 25-23.

Monday saw the scene transfer to the Kowloon Bowling Green Club for the Classic Pairs. Early rounds played under cloudless skies witnessed mixed fortunes for all teams save Canada and Wales who survived the first six games unbeaten. Fiji, Scotland and England were also favourably placed but New Zealand and Ireland had suffered early setbacks which put their eventual qualification under considerable question. End to end wins to both saw them earn quarter-final berths along with England, Canada, Wales, Australia, Scotland and the only local team to qualify, Filipino Club.

Cold and wet weather descended on Hong Kong as we went into the concluding stages of the Classic Pairs. Scotland, skipped by Brian Middlemass and with Richard Corsie leading, revelled in the conditions beating the Kiwis 21 to 14. The Irish pair of Willie Watson and Ernie Parkinson went into overdrive to defeat the strong English pair of John Ottoway and Wynne Richards by 21 to 10. Whether it was the sudden cold spell or simply the superiority of their opponents but the stars of the Qualifying Rounds Canada and Wales both faltered in the quarters to be beaten by Filipino Club and the Australians thus ending their hopes of further glory. The Irish pair were always on top in their semi-final against the local Filipino Club side and posted a 27-17 win to play their first final. The last game of this year's Classic began with both Scots and Irish pairs recording even scores as they battled through the first ten ends with the Scots enjoying a narrow 11-9 advantage. On the 14th end the men from the North finally put paid to any hopes of an Irish come-back by scoring a decisive seven scampering to a 23-10 lead which Watson and Parkinson could not peg back.

Hong Kong was again treated to a superb exhibition of bowls and reacted by showing their visitors true hospitality during their stay in our city.
