

As we look back on the year just passed many highlights present themselves from the bowls scene. Another successful League competition was conducted under the efficient supervision of Bob Brown and his League Sub-Committee. Special mention must be made of K.C.C for winning the first and second division titles and having three teams in the 1989 first division.

In National Competitions congratulations must go to Jacky Wong for winning the "Bowler of the Year" title and to all players who won national titles during the Year. It is a very crowded calendar but the Sub-Committee charged with running National Competitions and headed by Mel Stewart did a superb job in getting all events off in the time allotted.

On the International scene Noel Kennedy represented Hong Kong in the World Indoor Championships in London and was somewhat unfortunate to come up against the eventual winner, Hugh Duff, in the first round. George Souza was also in England playing in the Gateway Invitation Singles and Pairs at Worthing. A team of five players and a Manager was in Tweed Heads in August for the Bicentennial Tournament and a silver medal was won in the fours with substantial prize money being brought back for the benefit of the Association. In addition Keith Bosley represented Hong Kong in several Australian tournaments held throughout the year.

The 1988 Hongkong Bank Bowls Classic was an undoubted success and the unbeaten record of the Hong Kong pair of Mark McMahon and Noel Kennedy was a truly outstanding record and one that has never been achieved before. I would like to make special mention of the efforts of my Organising Committee who worked tirelessly to ensure the Classic was of a high standard.

The training courses at Victoria Park were again popular, attracting a large number of persons who wish to play the game of Lawn Bowls. Under the leadership of Boniface Lau a number of coaches turned out to give guidance to the many beginners who signed on for these courses. Funding for this activity comes from the sports promotion scheme operated by Urban Council and in conjunction with the training courses next year should witness the laying of two artificial surfaces at Victoria Park, the installation of flood lights and a new clubhouse being constructed.

Finally, I would like to express my sincere appreciation to all the Officers of the Association for their support and also my thanks to all club conveners who assisted so much in the administration of the sport here in Hong Kong

REPORT 1988 - 1989

Once again this has been a very busy year for the L.L.B.A with involvement in three International events.

The first was a combined International, being the Bicentennial Bowls Tournament held at Tweedheads, N.S.W. Australia. The team which had been selected to participate at the 6th Women's World Bowls in Auckland, N.Z. later in the year attended. It was decided that this tournament offered an ideal opportunity to help prepare for the World Bowls event.

This proved so, as conditions and greens in Tweedheads were vastly different to those here in H.K. Although the final standings were disappointing, the experience gained was invaluable for the team, and this was proved with their performance at the 6th Women's World Bowls held in Auckland at the end of last year. At this event H.K. finished 7th overall, 13th in the Singles, 8th in the Pairs, 6th in the Fours and a Bronze Medal in the Triples. We are therefore, justifiably very proud of the results, considering that 23 countries were taking part. Because of their performance, the L.L.B.A received a Grant from A.S.F. & D.C of \$22,000.00 under the incentive Awards Scheme.

The third International event was the Paralympics held in Seoul and the performance of the bowlers playing for H.K. was outstanding considering that those chosen had had so little time to practise. We are especially proud of the fact that Mrs. Lena Sadick was invited to these games as an official Umpire. H.K. Blind Bowlers with the help of Mrs. Sadick and a group of volunteers are at the moment preparing for the World Blind Bowls Tournament being held in Zimbabwe later in 1989. We wish them great success. Grateful thanks to all individuals, Companies and Clubs for their generous donations which has made a possibility a reality.

## SECRETARY'S REPORT 1988 - 1989

The summer leagues comprised no less than thirty nine teams from the fifteen member clubs of the HKLBA. Division 1 winners were KCC (A) with Divisions 2, 3 and 4 being won by KCC (B), Cde R (B) and POC (B) respectively. The Bertlitz Winter league winners were KCC in Division 1 and PSRC in Division 2.

The success story of the year was the superb triumph of Noel and Mark in winning this year's Classic. They came through the entire competition undefeated which was the first time this had been achieved. In the final Brett Morley and John Bell of England tried everthing they knew but although getting to an extra end it was Noel and Mark who deservedly took the honours. Filipino Club distinguished themselves again and newcomers P.O.C. showed they were a pair to be reckoned with. The weather this time was kind to us and from the inovative Pro-Am onwards gave little cause for concern. Once again we supplied a "supersub" in the shape of Frank Golder who replaced Wilf Stephens of Fiji who had to sit out two games due to the flu. A very successful Classic but the rising cost of accommodation does give cause for concern.

Overseas our representation in prestige tournaments continued with individual invitations for George Souza to the Gateway Masters and a repeat invitation for George to this year's Woolwich Masters which replaces the Gateway. Noel Kennedy received an invitation to the Embassy World Indoor Bowls Championship and this year Mark McMahon has received an invitation to the same tournament.

Hong Kong was represented at the Tweed Heads Bicentennial International Bowls Tournament by Bill and Mark McMahon, George Souza, Noel Kennedy and Ian Ho. Ken Wallis and Dennis Blyth won the Gold Medal at the Law Enforcement Olympics in Australia and Keith Bosley has received invitations to tournaments in Australia.

Victoria Park greens look set for a face lift as Government plans for two artificial greens await approval together with an upgrade with changing rooms for ladies and men being added with a meeting room and kitchen facilities. Vice President Keith Bosley continues to liase with Governement and it is hoped to see the first of the new greens operational in early 1991. Boniface Lau has continued the organisation of the bowls classes at Victoria Park with his team of coaches.

A major event of the year was the "Bowl for Hope" twenty four hour sponsored tournament organised by KBGC in December. This raised over \$200,000 for the Kidney Foundation. A magnificent achievement by organisers and participants and one which, hopefully, will be repeated in 1989.

## THE SIXTH WOMEN'S WORLD BOWLS 1988

The Sixth Women's World Bowls tournament was held in Auckland, New Zealand from the 20th November to December 2nd 1988. The Tournament venue was the Henderson Bowling Club.

Hong Kong was one of 23 countries who had accepted an invitation to participate. The Team selected to represent Hong Kong was:-

We left Hong Kong on the morning of the 10th November and arrived a little more than 24hrs later. to be met at Auckland Airport by the Ladies of the Pakuranga Women's combined club who were to be our host club. They were to treat us from our arrival to our departure with the utmost kindness and courtesy and we owe them a deep debt of gratitude especially President Shirley Johnson and President John Wells.

Following a very colourful opening ceremony on 20th November the tournament began with the Triples and Pairs competitions. Rosemary and Joan made an impressive start with some very good wins, one to note was against England who, uptil then were undefeated. However in the crucial later stages games were lost and after the play offs, they finished fourth in their section. The Triples having lost the first game to Kenya, soon put this reverse behind them and produced a steady performance to finish second in their section and after the play offs, finished in Third place and gained a Bronze medal.

Rain interrupted the tournament for two days after three games in the Singles and Fours had been played. It was necessary then for the organizers to reduce the remaining fours games from 21 to 15 ends and the Singles from 25 to 21 shots. The Fours Naty, Sandi, Rosemary and Rae won the first seven games. the first six by clear margins and by one shot against Scotland in the seventh. A medal was on the horizon, but alas this was not to be, for losing the remaining three games they finished Third in their section and in the play off lost 23-14 to Zimbabwe which placed them sixth in the competition.

Joan won her first few games convincingly only then to strike a bad patch which was not easy to overcome. She finished seventh in her section and thirteenth in the competition.

Hong Kong were placed in seventh position in the overall tournament. This can be seen as a most creditable performance and one of which the team can be justly proud.

The Bronze medal in the Triples plus \$22,000 performance monies were an added bonus.

## AUSTRALIAN BICENTENNIAL BOWLS TOURNAMENT 1988

### AT TWEED HEADS AUSTRALIA

Our Associations were delighted to accept an invitation to take part in a Bowls Tournament to celebrate the Australian Bicentenary and held at Tweed Heads in New South Wales. The tournament was of the highest calibre with the competing countries sending their strongest sides with the added incentive of considerable prize money. Along with hosts Australia, Hong Kong was pitted against New Zealand, U.S.A, Canada, Papua New Guinea, Fiji and a combined Great Britain.

The Club premises and facilities at Tweed Heads are second to none and our players enjoyed the best of conditions on and off the greens. We were also most fortunate to be allotted Palm Beach-Currumbin as our host club and with their greens being made readily available to us our teams were able to adjust to the 17-20 second greens in the practices before the commencement of the tournament.

Indeed, our teams were overwhelmed by the hospitality and sincere support received from our Palm Beach friends and our gratitude goes out to Presidents, Jack McLelland and Rosina Harris and all their club members, with a special mention for Colin James and Doug Noble. Hong Kong also received help in our preparation from local stars Ken Williams and Brian Hampton and old friend Ron Hedges, and under the watchful eyes of team managers Pat O'Dea and Sandi Zakoske our men and ladies approached what was obviously going to be a demanding tournament in a confident manner.

In the event there were for Hong Kong, as always in bowls, triumphs and tragedies and certainly, for both our teams, some near misses and might-have-beens.

### MENS RESULTS

#### SINGLES

#### NOEL KENNEDY

Noel had a fine tournament winning 5 out of 7 matches and did not have a single poor game. His ability to change from accurate heavy shots to immaculate drawing was most impressive and he can consider himself most unfortunate in missing out on a play-off for the Gold by only 15 shots overall. In finishing fourth Noel did his considerable reputation no harm at all.

PAIRS

MEL STEWART & BILL MCMAHON

Despite the unfamiliar format of 2-2-2-2, Mel and Bill got off to a fine start with a win over Australian pair Woods and Williams. Fortune did not continue to smile on them however as, apart from sound defeats by New Zealand and Great Britain, all other 4 matches were not decided till the final bowl with 3 of the results going against them, the most agonising moment being when Bill drew the final shot against Canada when all square only to see the bowl slowly fall away from the jack seconds later. Hong Kong finished seventh.

TRIPLES

IAN HO, NOEL KENNEDY, MARK MCMAHON

The trio played well throughout displaying a good blend and sound analysis. The crucial moments were in the matches against Great Britain and Fiji when the opposing skips managed to burn the final ends with their third bowls when game down, winning the replayed end. Fifth position did not do the team justice.

FOURS

MEL STEWART, IAN HO, BILL MCMAHON, MARK MCMAHON

The four immediately struck up a good rapport and, despite three narrow defeats, big victories against Great Britain and U.S.A. saw them qualify for the Gold Medal play off against the host team. Torrential rain before the final meant drastically changed conditions and our team never settled against a competent Australian combination and finished with the silver medal.

Joan played well in a tournament of stars. With opponents such as Margaret Johnson, Merle Richardson and Millie Khan life was not going to be easy but she deserved better than seventh place, with good victories being scored over Fiji and U.S.A.

With two games remaining our girls were in 3rd position and due to play 2nd placed New Zealand. When Rosemary drew a close final bowl we looked good for a medal, but Millie Khan drew inside Rosemary's shot and the game was lost 13-12. This was only one of three narrow defeats and Hong Kong finished 6th.

The Triple started each game strongly but fell away in the latter part of each game securing only one victory, and that against the strong New Zealand team. The later result in World Bowls showed that experience gained was worthwhile.

Much was expected from this strong combination and in the end 5th place was somewhat disappointing. The highlight was an exceptional 25-18 win over Great Britain and had that form been maintained, expectations would have been fulfilled.

Everything considered the tour was a great success and as far as the Ladies were concerned results in New Zealand proved the value of the exercise. It was a great honour for Hong Kong to be invited and to return with the Men's Fours Silver Medal added the icing to the cake.

REPORT ON THE HONGKONG BANK INTERNATIONAL  
BOWLS CLASSIC 1988

This years Classic was almost totally sponsored by the Hongkong Bank with minor sponsorship from Cathay Pacific, Waco Formscaff and the HK Government. This year for the first time, a Pro-Am tournament was initiated by the Bank to raise money for a covered walkway in a school for handicapped children. The teams were sponsored by various companies and consisted of local entertainment and sporting personalities playing against the overseas teams and some of the local participants in the Classic. The event turned out to be a good social role up and the Bank was very pleased with the amount of money raised.

The Classic Singles was played on the following day at the Hong Kong Football Club in ideal bowling conditions. The standard of play ,as usual was very high with superb bowls being played by both overseas and local players. Mark McMahon and George Souza made it to the Quarter-Finals but despite playing good bowls, they were beaten by Jim Baker and Barry Salter respectively who met Richard Corsie and Terry Scott in the semi-finals. Both semi-finals produced the expected excitement especially in the accurate firing shots of Jim Baker and Richard Corsie and on both games, the results were not decided until the last three ends. Richard Corsie and Barry Salter met in the final and there again the high standard of bowls being played was a pleasure to watch. Richard Corsie eventually was the victor after a hard fought match with the jack being taken into the ditch five times on five consecutive ends.

After the Singles Final, we were treated to a great evening in the company of Acker Bilk in the restaurant of the Hong Kong Football Club and it was a fitting end to a enjoyable weekend of bowls.

The Pairs competition took place at the Kowloon Bowling Green Club and the evening games were strongly supported by local bowlers and visitors. Throughout the competition, the local club teams played very well with the team from the Police Officers Club, playing in their first Classic,establishing themselves as a team to be reckoned with. The HK duo of Mark McMahon and Noel Kennedy were definitely the team to watch as they marched through the rounds without dropping a game.

## QUARTER FINALS.

C.C.C. vs F.C. F.C. established a lead of 9-2 over CCC at the 6th end and led 13-6 after the 12th end. CCC could not produce the form which they displayed in earlier rounds, and were always struggling against some very good bowling by F.C who were worthy winners at 21-10.

Hong Kong v Newcastle District. Newcastle took an early lead against H.K. and after the 6th end were leading 6-3. H.K. then scored a 4, a 3 and a 2 to lead 12-6 after the 9th end. With excellent bowling they took the score to 20-8 after the 15th end. N.C.D were always struggling against good bowling from the H.K. pair, and eventually conceded the game on the 19th end to H.K. with the score on 26-9.

England v U.S.R.C. England bowled consistently well to take a 12-0 lead after the 5th end. After the 12th end England led 20-4 but U.S.R.C then staged a recovery with good bowling, taking the score to 20-17, before England recorded their first score in 7 ends. England then scored a single on the 19th end and eventually won 23-18.

K.C.C v Ireland. Ireland bowled superbly to take an early lead, and led 17-3 after the 10th end. K.C.C staged a mini-recovery, although Ireland, who bowled well throughout the game were worthy winners when K.C.C conceded the game on the 20th end with the score on 23-14.

## SEMI-FINALS.

Ireland v England. The opening ends produced good bowling and England held a 5-1 lead after the 5th end. England continued to dominate and good lead bowling by Brett Morley set up the ends for John Bell. After the 10th end England led 11-1, however Ireland persevered and England led 15-3 after the 15th end. Ireland scored a four on the 17th end, but after the 20th end, with England leading 20-8, Ireland conceded. England bowled exceptionally well and unfortunately Ireland could not maintain their high standard of play as demonstrated in the quarter final.

## 24 HOUR LAWN BOWLS COMPETITION

On Friday 2nd December 1988 six Clubs took part in the first 24 hour sponsored lawn bowls competition in Hong Kong. The competition was held on the greens of Kowloon Bowling Green Club with the aim to raise money for the Hong Kong Kidney Patients Trust Fund, a charity founded by Mrs. Jenny Parr in 1985. The Trust was formed to help those people who suffer from kidney failure and cannot afford the vital dialysis to keep them alive. Over \$360,000 is required each month to support 218 people, all low income, who need continuous help until such time as they can either receive Government support, a transplant or die.

The Clubs who agreed to take part were Kowloon Bowling Green Club, Kowloon Cricket Club, United Services Recreation Club, Hong Kong Football Club, Hong Kong Cricket Club and a joint police team from the Police Officers Club and the Police Sports & Recreation Club. The competition was played in a triples format with 9 players representing each Club. Each trio played for 2 hours and then 4 hours off.

Numerous companies in Hong Kong were approached to sponsor each Club for a certain amount of money. Unfortunately at the end of the day only four agreed to do so. These being the Hong Kong Telephone Co., Hong Kong & China Gas Co., K.P.S. Video Express and Telecommunications & Security Services Ltd. Many of the companies who felt unable to fully support the event did, however, make contributions in varying amounts. Members of each Club were also asked to sponsor their team either on a lump sum basis or for a certain amount of money per shot scored.

To the great relief of the organisers at KBGC, the weather remained fine if somewhat cold during the night. The games were keenly contested right up to the last bowl as can be seen from the results below:-

## Ladies Knockout Singles and Plate



# Postscript

A few years ago Indoor Bowling was still a useful adjunct to the outdoor summer game but no more than that, and still regarded by many as something of a novelty. In this age of vast armies of armchair spectators, however, the little brother has come of age and with television coverage, sponsorship, best of three, five, seven or even nine sets, large cash prizes and the creation of a number of players with star status, the situation has become reversed. The World Indoor Singles may have outgrown Coatbridge, its traditional venue, and it seems only a matter of time till a fours equivalent is mooted, although such a tournament may not have the same quality of 'instant' television appeal. A big money Pairs already exists and as the pendulum swings further outdoor bowling may find it difficult to retain the sponsorship the game now needs to hold its own at the top level. The decision in Edinburgh to define a 'professional player' is another incentive for the top bowlers to compete for the rewards on offer and as these players become more committed to the indoor game all-year-round indoor bowling may become a reality.


Where does Hong Kong stand in all this? Sad to say, we don't seem to have maintained our position over the past year. We did not receive an invitation to Coatbridge having been included if memory serves me, in the event since its inception. I recall fine showings by Philip Chok and by Gary Dang in the past. I had expected that our added prestige gained from our International Classic would have ensured our invitation to such events but have been proved wrong. I notice that we are also missing from the upcoming Midland Bank Pairs in which George Souza partnered Israel's Bransky last year. It appears that nobody is going to come knocking on our door asking us to come to the party and perhaps it is now time for us to sell ourselves to the organisers and canvas for inclusion in the top events in the indoor calendar. Failure to do so may prevent us from establishing a reputation at what may become an important juncture in the game's history. Lawn Bowls may soon be termed more simply — Bowls.

Although property prices may preclude an indoor facility in Hong Kong, replacement of grass by carpet may be the answer to the increasing arguments over green standards, speed etc. and the added practice on the surface would leave us better prepared for international events. Certainly more consideration could be given to making greater use of our existing artificial surfaces in the later rounds of National Competitions.

It was with sadness that we saw the passing during the season of two of our best known players, Jack Hollis and George Tipe. Jack was a great supporter of the local scene, always present at fund-raising and social events and a generous, open-hearted gentleman of the game. He was an ever-present on the cold terraces of Edinburgh last summer and must have derived great pleasure from his wife Jo's superb performance in the Fours. No mean Bowler, Jack played a leading part in P.O.C.'s Championship success in 1985 and was only touched off for the Division 3 top skip title by clubmate Stuart Kavanagh. 'The Thin Man', George Tipe was a much respected player and also featured in a championship win in 1985 with I.R.C. George was always pleasant company, gracious in both victory and defeat. One of the highlights of his career was a fine run in the Pairs in the early eighties when partnering Norrie Smith, a single shot defeat in the semi-final, after an unlucky start had left them well behind. Jack and George leave behind pleasant memories.

In conclusion may I wish you all happy bowling and much enjoyment in the coming season.
